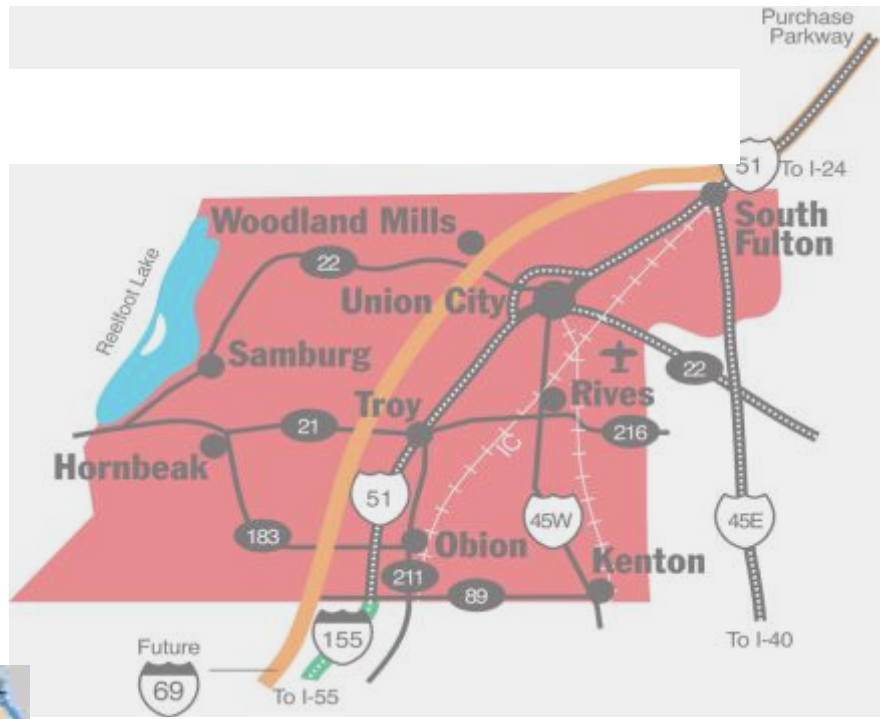

Obion County Communities



Hornbeak, Tennessee

Hornbeak is nestled in the rolling hills of western Obion County, just a few miles west of Troy and a short drive from scenic Reelfoot Lake. For many years this quaint little town was known as Wilsonville. The town's name was later changed to Hornbeak after the proprietor of the town's general store, Frank Hornbeak. Hornbeak was incorporated in 1916.

Kenton, Tennessee



Kenton - named after Simon Kenton, a frontiersman, Indian fighter, surveyor, and an intimate friend of Daniel Boone - is a bedroom community of 1,308 located at the heart of the quad-county area, approximately 15 minutes from four county seats, on Highway 45 West and Highway 89. Kenton is in two counties (Obion & Gibson Counties) and is located 45 miles north of Jackson, Tennessee, 75 miles southwest of Kentucky Lake, 35 miles southeast of Reelfoot Lake and 5 miles from the Obion River bottom and Half Moon Lake.

The city of Kenton's City Hall is centrally located on Highway 45 West. A police department with five full-time and three part-time policemen and a volunteer fire department serves the city. Kenton Utilities serves the community with water and sewer. The city also has a top-notch street department.

The new Kenton School opened its doors in the fall of 2002. The new 20,000 square foot facility offers large classrooms, a state of the art cafeteria, library, a large common/meeting area, administrative area, and a deluxe playground center.

Kenton is very unique as it is the home of the largest concentration of white squirrels in the nation. No one knows for sure where the white squirrels came from. The legend is that a traveling band of gypsies stopped outside of Kenton and asked a farmer to stay on his land for the night. The farmer welcomed the band. As a way of payment for the farmer's generosity, the gypsies gave the farmer a matched pair of white squirrels. After the band had

left, the farmer released the squirrels in the towering pecan trees on his property. The squirrels multiplied and spread over the town. The city adopted the furry creatures and enacted laws to protect them. Those laws remain on the books to this day. Many local residents feed and care for the squirrels. The new white squirrel sanctuary has many feeders and breeding boxes among the 50 species of trees. The new park is home to two covered pavilions, a gazebo, a one-mile scenic walking trail, a softball field, a gymnasium, and bathroom facilities. The best time to view the squirrels is during the early morning or late afternoon hours since the squirrels take refuge in the tree tops during the heat of the day.

The people of Kenton are a close-knit community, and show their pride for the community with the White Squirrel Festival featuring a parade, street dance, and fireworks display each July 4th.

Obion, Tennessee

Obion, Tennessee is located on Highway 183, east of highway 51, only 16 miles from the famous Reelfoot Lake. Illinois Central Railroad runs through the town and Obion River/Gooch's Hunting & Fishing Reserve borders the town to the south.

Obion proudly provides its residents a typical small town environment, a haven for retirement, with a slow leisurely lifestyle. Tradition plays an important role in the lives of the townspeople, the majority of whom are over fifty. Obion also proudly offers an abundant water supply to its farmers and industries.

Obion's principal crops are wheat, cotton, corn and soybeans. In the spring and fall, farm trucks can be seen moving through town as they journey to the Obion Grain Company. Reelfoot Metal is also located in Obion, fulfilling all your metal roofing or other project needs.

Rives, Tennessee

Located just south of Union City, Rives was originally known as Troy Station. Settlers from South Carolina first came to the area in the 1820's and by the 1850's the town was flourishing because of the Mobile and Ohio Railroad. Rives has a rich railroad history and at one time the town had several hotels to serve the passenger trains that traveled the area.

Samburg, Tennessee

The town of Samburg was named for the man who ran a store in the town in the early 1900's. Situated on the southern shore of historic Reelfoot Lake, Samburg thrives as a tourist destination year-round.

Samburg attracts thousands of visitors to town for fishing trips to Reelfoot Lake during the summer and spring months and for waterfowl hunting during the fall and winter months. Visitors also come to town during the winter months to catch a glimpse of the bald eagles that call Reelfoot Lake their home. And when you're not enjoying the great outdoors, you can also duck inside one of the many fine restaurants that offer up plates of fried crappie and catfish.

South Fulton, Tennessee

South Fulton is located in the far northeast corner of Obion County and borders Fulton, Kentucky. The town was first known as Jacksonville since the land in the area once belonged to President Andrew Jackson.

The Chamber of Commerce of the Twin Cities serves South Fulton and Fulton, Kentucky. A new South Fulton High School and Middle School were recently built off the Highway 45 East Bypass and Tyson Foods has a feed mill in operation in the city. South Fulton boasts a variety of recreational facilities and several major industries.

Troy, Tennessee

One of American history's most colorful heroes, Davy Crockett, is credited with helping map out the town of Troy. The town's first house was a double log cabin that was used as a tavern until the late 1820's. Troy was the first incorporated town of Obion County in early 1834.



Troy is located just south of Union City, in the heart of Obion County, at the far northwest corner of Tennessee. Troy is about 105 miles from Memphis, Tennessee. When the town celebrated its sesquicentennial in 1975, there were 933 residents, 35 businesses, 2 lumberyards, a feed mill, and a garment factory in operation.

Today, Troy has a population of 1,273, which is growing. Troy is enjoying tremendous growth with housing developments on a new 18-hole golf course, a new municipal complex, and an Industrial Park. The Troy Industrial Park contains some of the best tracts of land in Obion County. Located on U.S. Highway 51, the park has over 25 acres available with all utilities located on site.

Troy has several major events that are held annually. Troy Community Involvement Days are held on the 2nd weekend in July. Vendors from all over come to setup in the city park. There are activities and games for all ages. The Pecan Festival is held Labor Day weekend. During this time, there is a Classic Car Show, Poker Runs, bakeoffs, a quilt show, and a good ole-fashion get-together in the City Park. Music on the Square is held the 2nd Tuesday of every month, and in the winter months it is held at Greater Vision Church. At Christmas time, the town has a parade the 2nd Saturday in December. During the Christmas season, Troy's town square is brightly lit with a variety of colorful holiday displays that always attract visitors to the downtown.

Troy has a police department, a fire department, a conference center (The Moffatt Centre), a senior citizens building, and a city hall. The town has several banks, popular eating places like Autry's and Patsy's Diner among other restaurants. A grocery store, the Dollar General

Store, a pharmacy, doctor's offices, 2 sawmills, convenience stores, churches, an elementary school, a high school, a park and walking track, tennis courts, ball fields, and an electric company are all located in Troy.

Union City, Tennessee

Union City serves as the Regional Trade Center for northwest Tennessee and southwest Kentucky, as well as the county seat for Obion County. This community was recently designated as a "micropolitan area" by the U.S. census. The city is centrally located relevant to U.S. population centers and is 140 miles north of Memphis and 175 miles west of Nashville. Union City is served by all four modes of transport:



- **Rail** – Union City is directly served by the Canadian National (CN) Railroad, the only rail carrier in the U.S. that provides coast to coast service from the Atlantic to the Pacific as well as Canada to the Gulf Coast.
- **Water** – The Port of Cates Landing Deepwater/Slackwater Port is being constructed in neighboring Lake County, approximately 20 miles west. The port is scheduled to be operational in 2014.
- **Air** – The Everett-Stewart Regional Airport is located on Airport Circle Road just south of State Highway 431 (Old Highway 22) approximately 4 miles southeast of Union City and has an existing runway and parallel taxiway of 6,500 feet. It is one of only eleven airports in the state with an ILS (Instrument Landing System), and it has the capability to serve 67% of the nation's most popular corporate business jet aircraft operating at maximum capacity. The airport has much undeveloped land surrounding the airfield with significant potential for a variety of uses. Everett-Stewart Regional Airport is becoming a general aviation airport facility that is required for an entire region, not just a community and is on its way to becoming a "World Class" General Aviation Airport.
- **Highway** – Union City is presently served by U.S. 51 connecting to the Kentucky Interstate System and I-55 and SR 22 providing direct access to I-40 near Jackson, Tennessee. SR 45 is scheduled to be upgraded to four-lane within 36 months and will provide direct linkage to I-40 at Jackson. In addition to the four-lane highways, Interstate 69's construction start-up is

anticipated during 2009.

In the 1850's, the railroad played a major role in the development of West Tennessee, especially Union City that served as crossroads for two major railways linking the south with the north.

In 1852, General G.W. Gibbs employed a civil engineer from Richmond, Virginia to survey for a location for a rail line that would link Nashville, Tennessee to Hickman, Kentucky. He marked the spot by writing "Union City" with red chalk on a white oak tree. Union City became incorporated in 1867.

A lot has changed in 150 years, but Union City still honors its past. In the heart of Union City, you can find the renovated Capitol Theatre, Kiwanis Park, the Obion County Museum and the Church Street Railroad Depot. While in downtown, you can also enjoy the numerous restaurants, antique shops, specialty shops and clothing stores.

Woodland Mills, Tennessee

Woodland Mills is believed to have gotten its name from the fact that when it was settled it was primarily a wooded area and the earlier industries were mills. The town was developed at the crossing of the Nashville and Northwestern Railroads that were built here in the late 1850's.

Incorporated in 1968, Woodland Mills is situated just north of Union City off the Union City - Hickman Highway. Today, Woodland Mills has its own community center, where dances, reunions and other community events are held. And, in addition to the city's fine senior citizen center, there is also a city park with tennis courts, a walking track and a ball field. Inside Woodland Mills City Hall, there is an area dedicated to the city's history.

Living Conditions

Climate

- **Snowfall** – Variable from year to year though most winters have very little. Average snowfall is 2.5 inches with a frost-free period from March 20 to November 12; a total of 236 days.
- **Sunshine** – The yearly percentage of possible sunshine is 60% with 45% for January, 62% for April, 72% for July, and 66% for October.
- **Temperature/Precipitation/Humidity** – Obion County has pronounced seasonal variations in both temperature and precipitation. Below is a chart showing average monthly temperature, precipitation, and humidity for our area.
- **Wind** – The prevailing winds are from the South-Southwest.

Things To Do

Cultural Activities

- **Community Concerts**— Community Concerts sponsors an annual series of concerts by nationally known groups and individuals. Past presentations include: The Glen Miller Orchestra, Floyd Cramer, the Mac Frampton Trio, and The Platters.
- **Masquerade Theatre** — The *Masquerade Theatre*, a local theater group, presents four or more high-quality productions annually. Past productions include: *Grease*, *Oklahoma!*, *Oliver*, *The Sound of Music*, *Cats*, *The Wizard of Oz*, *Dearly Beloved* and *Steel Magnolias*. Masquerade Theater recently took on the task of acquiring and renovating the historical *Capitol Theater*, which is located on First Street in downtown Union City.



Historic Sites

- **Campground Cemetery** — This cemetery is the burial place of many county pioneers, located 3 miles south of Troy. Wilson Cabin (unmarked), where county organization took place, is 2 miles south of the cemetery.
- **Court Square, Troy** — Troy was the first town (1825) and original county seat (1825-1890) of Obion County. It was also the site of the first courthouse. Davy Crockett helped to layout the town.
- **First Monument of Unknown Confederate Dead** – This monument was erected in 1869 to honor the unknown Confederates who died during the Civil War. It is listed on the National Register and the first monument ever erected by a group to honor the unknown Confederate dead.



Museums

- **Old Car Museum** – The Old Car Museum is a division of Dixie Gun Works which supplies equipment for collectors of antique and replica muzzle-loading arms. The museum features antique automobiles, farm engines, antique car accessories, and an 1850 log gun shop.

➤ **Obion County Museum** – Founded in 1970, the Obion County Museum is celebrating its 33rd year of operation. The museum has numerous exhibits that are periodically changed.

In addition to our main building, we have on site, a reconstructed authentic log cabin and a one-room 'Little Red School House'. A storage building is also located on the property that is used to store artifacts that are not currently being displayed.



The purpose of the Obion County Museum is to preserve our past heritage, not so we can live in the past, but by knowing our heritage, we can better live in the present and plan for the future. A fascinating look back into Obion County's colorful history can be found at the Obion County Museum. Eagle Watching

Reelfoot Lake is the home of one of the largest wintering populations of eagles in the country. From January to March, the number of bald eagles spending their winter at the lake ranges from 100-200 birds. These majestic birds can be viewed on land or by boat; however, the most popular way to observe and learn about the eagles is through the guided tours that are available. All tours are lead by state park rangers and naturalists, who provide plenty of eagle information along the way.
